Do you qualify?

If your income is below the monthly limit, and you have \$5,000 or less in assets (like a bank account, etc.) you may be eligible. Check your eligibility by calling 2-1-1 or online at https://fssabenefits.in.gov/

HOW TO APPLY:

You can apply online, by mail or fax, or in person at your county DFR office. To apply online, print an application, or find your county office visit

https://www.in.gov/fssa/dfr/2999.htm or call 1-800-403-0864 to have an application mailed to you. Once submitted, you will be contacted for an interview. Be sure to open any mail from FSSA and return requested info to complete the process!

What documentation you will need:

You will be asked to provide information about your eligibility during the telephone interview. You must provide documentation to verify your eligibility within 13 days of the interview. You will need to provide ID, Social Security Numbers for everyone for whom you are applying, proof of your expenses like rent and utilities, and proof of income, such as pay stubs, unemployment benefits, and child support. You can mail copies of the information or fax it to FSSA. Once your application is completed, you should know in 30 days or less whether you are eligible, what your benefits will be, and if you are not eligible the reason why.
