What is the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)?

The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) allows schools to provide breakfast and lunch at no charge to all students.

- CEP is a 4-year cycle
- Schools, or groups of schools, must have an "Identified Student Percentage" (ISP) of 40% to operate CEP
- The district may implement CEP in one school, a group of schools or district-wide.









Benefits of CEP

- Support health, wellness, and food insecurity efforts in your community.
- Simplify meal service during reopening.
- Promote equity, eliminate stigma and unpaid school meal debt.
- Recover budget deficits in school nutrition programs.

Kids attending a school that is eligible for but not participating in CEP are at







Who are "Identified Students"?

Children categorically-eligible for free meals without submitting a school meal application and identified through direct certification

Students directly certified (through the Direct Certification Matching Process (DCMP)*) for free meals because they live in households that participate in:

- ✓ SNAP: Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program*
- ✓ Medicaid: (only those identified on direct certification list)*
- ✓ **TANF:** Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Cash Assistance
- ✓ **FDPIR**: Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- The extension of benefit allows <u>all</u> children within the same household to be included.

Students certified for free meals without application and not subject to income verification because they are:

- √ in foster care (certified by OCFS)
- ✓ in Head Start (certified by the Head Start coordinator listing)
- experiencing homelessness (certified by McKinney-Vento or homelessness liaison)
- ✓ migrants (certified by the migrant coordinator liaison)
- Their eligibility does <u>not</u> extend to siblings or other household members.





How CEP works



CEP Reimbursement Pattern

Two categories of reimbursement: Free & Paid





• Paid reimbursement rate = 100% – (ISP x 1.6)

"Magic ISP" = 62.5% (62.5% x 1.6 = 100% of meals reimbursed at the free rate)

ISP	x 1.6 Multiplier	% of Meals Reimbursed at "Free" rate	% of Meals Reimbursed at "Paid" Rate
40%	x1.6	64%	36%
45%	x1.6	72%	28%
50%	x1.6	80%	20%
55%	x1.6	88%	12%
60%	x1.6	96%	4%
65%	x1.6	100%	0%





Benefits of CEP

SNAP enrollment is increasing... That means ISPs are increasing, too.

Conduct direct certification often to ensure every newly eligible child is captured in your schools' ISPs.

Lock in a high (or higher!) ISP in SY20-21 and for the following 3 years.





Why CEP in the 2020-2021 School Year?



CEP will help with...

- Counting and claiming for new and more complex school meals operations
 - Counting meals by fee category may not be necessary
 - May be able to use a clicker or tally to make cafeteria meal service quicker
 - No need to swipe student IDs or use pin pads
 - Lunch in the classroom is easier
- Easier training for non-food service staff (e.g. teachers) who may be involved with serving and counting meals this year
- Student and staff safety at the point of service
 - No need to swipe student IDs or use pin pads
 - Fewer surfaces to touch





Why CEP in the 2020-2021 School Year? (cont'd)



CEP will help with...

- Decreasing financial stress among students and families due to COVID-19
- Unpaid school meal debt
 - No collecting of fees = no more meal debt!
 - In schools operating standard counting and claiming this year, meal debt will likely be a larger problem than last
 - General fund does not have to bail out school nutrition fund
- Meal service for the next four years! CEP is a 4-year cycle.
- If P-EBT is reauthorized, CEP schools will have an easier job distributing funds.





Important Dates for CEP in the 20-21 SY

NYSED is now accepting CEP applications for the 2020-21 school year.

What is NEW for this year?

- Deadline to apply is August 31, 2020 (typically June 30th)
- Eligibility for CEP based on: Enrollment from any time between April 1, 2020 – June 30, 2020 and 2019-20 direct certification data




Grouping

- a group of schools within the district.

Grouping can maximize your federal reimbursement.




