SOUTH CAROLINA







Department of Agriculture (USDA) program coined
Summer Break Café in South Carolina, first launched in
1968. The program is designed to provide children and
teens up to two free meals per day during the summer
months. An estimated one in six South Carolina children
are at-risk of food insecurity – the limited or uncertain
access to adequate food. Summer Break Cafés help provide
much needed nutrition for children across the state.

In 2024, 3.7 million meals were served across 46 counties.

There are four key stakeholders that help operate the Summer Break Café program. USDA provides federal support and funding to states. The state administrative agency, SC Department of Education, is responsible for a variety of roles. Those responsibilities include:

- Approving all sponsor and site applications
- 2 Conducting all sponsor training for new and existing sponsors
- 3 Monitoring operations
- Processing claims for reimbursement
- 5 Administrative review of the program

Most community members are more familiar with the roles sponsors and sites play in the community. Sponsors are the organizations that are responsible for meals and overseeing sites. There are over 104 sponsors statewide. Sites are the locations from which children and teens receive their meals.



SPONSOR Requirements and Role

Sponsors are composed of a variety of organization types. For an organization to serve as a Summer Break Café sponsor, they must meet one of the following categories below:

1

Public or nonprofit private school food authority

2

Public or private nonprofit summer residential camp

3

Government entity (local, municipal, county, or state)

4

Public or nonprofit private colleges or universities that participate in the national youth sports program

5

Private nonprofit organizations

Sponsors are responsible for a variety of tasks to ensure they can effectively implement the Summer Break Café program, including:

- Providing technical assistance and monitoring of their sites
- Financial and administrative duties
- Provide annual training for their sites
- Source a vendor or self-prep meals
- Promote the Summer Break Café program





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Rural Non-Congregate Counties Summer 2024

Only schools that participate in the National School Lunch Program can participate in the Seamless Summer Option (SSO). This option provides a slightly lower reimbursement rate, however, it operates under the same rules as the National School Lunch Program making for a more seamless transition into summer.

Non-profits, government entities, colleges and universities and residential summer camps are only able to participate in the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) model option. Schools may also choose to operate their Summer Break Café program under this model to receive a higher reimbursement rate compared to the SSO option.







Every year USDA releases updated reimbursement rates for the program based on changes in the consumer price index. Below are the rates for summer 2025. Please note that all sponsor expenditures are covered in the reimbursement rate including food costs, administrative costs, packaging, logistics, etc. Sponsors can serve up to two meals per day to a site. Sites can receive a variety of meal types on the same day including: breakfast and lunch, snack and lunch, morning snack and afternoon snack or dinner and snack. Sponsors are not able to provide a site lunch and dinner on the same day.

Meal Types	Rural or Self-Prep Rates	All Other Site Type Rates
Breakfast	\$3.0875	\$3.03

Self-prep sites can buy ingredients and prepare a meal on-site each day, buy already prepared food and reheat it each day or utilize a combination of the two. Sites that prepare meals must have the capacity to do so safely— usually this means having a commercial-grade kitchen that meets health inspection standards. Sites that reheat prepared foods must also have some capacity for preparation (such as an oven or a microwave). Self-prep sites have more control over the type and variety of food they serve, but they still must follow the federal nutrition guidelines for reimbursement.

Vended sites have fully prepared meals delivered to them; thus, minimal daily food preparation is necessary at the site and may not be necessary depending on the meals provided. Sponsors have the responsibility of finding a vendor for their sites. This requires putting out a bid specifying sites' food and delivery requirements and signing a contract with the lowest bidder. However, if the vendor is a public-school food service department, the contract does not require additional bids.

SITE REQUIREMENTS ROLE

A site is a physical location approved by the state agency where meals are served, and children eat in a supervised setting. To be eligible to serve as a site the location must be in an area where at least 50% of children are eligible for free or reduced priced school meals based on either census or school data. Eligible sites are those that serve children in low-income areas or those that serve specific groups of low-income children. The Summer Break Café program is not an income-based program, therefore, any child or teen 18 and younger is able to eat at a site. Sites are required to:

- Attend training provided by their sponsor
- Keep record of meals served
- Distribute meals to children and teens according to the USDA program guidelines
- Store food appropriately before serving
- Provide site supervision

Summer Break Café sites can operate in both rural and urban settings. In December 2023, USDA established the rural non-congregate option. For years, all kids and teens that ate a meal at a Summer Break Café site had to consume the meal on site due to the congregate meal requirement. This is still the case for urban sites, however, now sites that are designated rural by USDA have more flexibility where youth are no longer required to eat their meal on site. Rural sites have several options to make it easier for kids and teens to access meals including:

Grab and Go Option

Children and teens can simply pick up an already prepared meal(s) and eat at the time and location of their choice.

Bulk Meal Option

Through this option children and teens can receive multiple meals at a time. For example, a teen may visit a site on Monday and pick up four meals (Monday and Tuesday) then return to the site on Wednesday to pick up enough meals for the rest of the week.

Parent/Guardian Pick up

A parent or guardian is now able to pick up food for kids and teens even without that youth being present. The parent/guardian must provide a school ID or another identifying method to showcase they have an eligible student in order to receive meals.

OUTREACH

It is very important for community members to help spread the word about Summer Break Café. Even though the program is 57 years old, many parents still are unfamiliar with the program. Most Summer Break Café sites operate for only several weeks out of the year; however, it takes year-round planning for the program to be successful. Local food policy councils, community health coalitions, and other community-wide groups are great fits to champion the program for the entire community. Community groups can plan an annual meeting during the spring to bring together sponsors, existing and potential new sites, parents, and community members to develop a plan to enhance the Summer Break Café experience for their community. Ideas for Promotion

- Encourage your local school district to share a list of sites in the area before the end of the school year.
- Invite your local officials to visit a site and promote the program on their social media channels.
- Ask faith-based groups in your community to put information about the Summer Break Café program in their weekly announcements.
- Post flyers at popular family locations in the community such as museums, libraries, laundromats, food banks and parks and recreation facilities.
- Contact your local tv station, radio station and newspaper to highlight the program.
- Display yard signs at each Summer Break Café site so children and teens can easily recognize them from the street.
- Include Summer Break Café flyers in bi-weekly FoodShare SC produce box distributions during the summer months.
